

Packers fan with months to live has wish granted

ALLOUEZ — It was a depressing day for David Marosek last April. He had been battling stage 4 rectal cancer since July 2016 and the treatment seemed to be working. "As of August of last year I thought I was in the clear," he said.

But then something changed. It was during a visit to his oncologist five months ago that Marosek learned the cancer had returned, spreading into his lungs and spine.

"I was told that it was terminal and they gave me like six months to a year" to live, he told The Compass in a telephone interview from his Oshkosh apartment. Marosek traveled to Milwaukee for a second opinion, which concluded the same findings. Rather than begin new treatments he chose to enter hospice.

"I've been in hospice now for a few months," he said. With the assistance of Aurora at Home Hospice, Marosek receives medical care and home visits from hospice staff, including Jayne Syrjamaki, Aurora at Home volunteer coordinator.

When hospice staff met
Marosek in July, they posed a
question to him: "If you had one
wish, what would it be?" It's
part of the hospice program's
"Drop in the Bucket" initiative to
grant small wishes to patients.
The wish was then turned over
to Syrjamaki. "He said he had
always wanted to go to a Packer
game," she said.

"I put out a message to a lot of businesses in the Oshkosh area that I was in need of tickets for a hospice patient to make his last wish come true," she said.

Syrjamaki waited for weeks, but got no replies. However, she was determined to fulfill Marosek's last wish because she could relate to his situation.

Syrjamaki decided to contact the Diocese of Green Bay.

Deacon's medal, lost for 37 years, found on Abbey grounds

ALLOUEZ — Deacon David Parker gazed at the small, four-way scapular medal in the palm of his hand. He had forgotten about it; understandable considering he had not seen it since the fall of 1981.

"It's very sentimental. It's very cool," he said.
"It looks like it's been in the ground for 37 years.

I'm surprised there is this much left of it."

Deacon Parker lost the medal during a football game on the St. Norbert Abbey grounds only weeks after he entered the Norbertine Order at age 21. The chain survived the game, but the medal had been missing until Mike Counter recently discovered it.

Counter, director of media relations at St. Norbert College, has been metal detecting on

the St. Norbert Abbey grounds for a special project in cooperation with the Norbertines.

"I didn't find a lot of medals out there, maybe three or four," said Counter. "I've spent 50 to 60 hours so far. I'm waiting for the crops to be removed out of the field, so I can get down by where Minahan Stadium used to be located."

Guardian angels

- 1 On Oct. 2 we celebrate the Memorial of the Guardian Angels.
- 2 In 1608, Pope Paul V set a specific feast day honoring guardian angels. The feast became part of the universal church calendar under Pope Clement X (1670-76).
- 3 The church teaches that each of us has an angel, during our entire life, "as protector and shepherd" (Catechism of the Catholic Church, n. 336).
- 4 Church teaching on guardian angels traces back to Matthew's Gospel (18:10), where Jesus says that the guardian angels of children always look upon the face of God.
- 5 In the 19th century, St. John of Vianney, a French priest, advised: "If you find it impossible to pray, hide behind your good angel and charge him to pray in your stead."

t is hard to believe that it has been four years since we began our journey on the mission map of discipleship formation! In 2014, we began with two years of formation in prayer and holiness — in learning more

ship with Jesus Christ. I will be sharing much more about these experiences in a series of columns that I will write over the next year. Through these columns, I hope to give you a high-level understanding of all that is going on in this wonderful diocese.

In 2018-20, on the leadership level, through "Worship Jesus," we will strive to understand the importance of the Mass and reclaiming Sunday as the center of our life as disciples. In these upcoming years we will, with your invaluable assistance and participation, implement simple ways to enhance our Sunday experience at Mass by making a few strategic and faithful improvements in sacred music, preaching, welcome and hospitality.

God willing, in 2020-2022 we will be learning more about how to "Share Jesus" and to witness to our faith by inviting others to follow the Lord in and through our parish communities. We will also learn how to impact our communities with the Good News through witness and especially service by intentionally contributing as a faith community to the life of the communities where we are located.

The diocesan staff has been working very hard to bring the new vision and mission statement, which you will see below, to life at the diocesan level and assist our parishes in bringing missionary discipleship forward to all those in our communities.
